Newton PTO Meeting March 20, 2018

Meeting began at 9:35 a.m. in room 1110.

Brian Ewert – LPS Superintendent

- LPS needs to think differently about its physical facilities. Some buildings are at the end of their life span. We need to be forward-thinking for the upcoming generations of students.
- The District achievement goal is for 100% of LPS students to graduate prepared for meaningful post-secondary opportunities. 25-30% of the kids who are going through the basic model of public schools are just being compliant. Are we allowing kids to be creative and find their passion? LPS teaches well, but how can we do things differently so that juniors and seniors in high school have pathways and options available, even if they don't go to college.
- He showed the video What we Know about Learning (YouTube).
 - Education has facilitated conformity rather than learning, and treats students as if they have the same brain.
 - Use pleasure, not pain to motivate. Make learning relevant, meaningful and enjoyable.
 - There are multiple entry points to learning, and multiple solution paths.
 - There are three ingredients to intrinsic motivation autonomy, connection (with each other and real world), and the pursuit of curiosity. Need the right combination of ability and challenge.
 - Passive learning doesn't get encoded in long-term learning. Active learning does.
 Self reflection is the final step of encoding to long-term learning.
- Teachers all agree this is the right model for teaching, but they don't have all the staffing and support needed. Some freshman classes in the high schools are up to 40 students.
- Colorado ranks 47th out of 50 in per pupil funding!
- The legislature implemented The Negative Factor, which has shortchanged LPS \$101 million in the last 8 years. LPS can't add new programs or do anything innovative. Facilities need renovating/are failing. Some can be renovated, some need rebuilding.
- In 2007-08, LPS was forward-thinking and made big cuts in closing schools. We never got that money back.
- Initiative 92: Many educators, school districts, and PTOs have come together to advocate for changes. This includes 178 superintendents.
 - Short term: We need money funneled into the negative factor for next year. We are advocating to Legislature that we need immediate funding for 2018-2019. This funding would go toward teacher retention, special education funding, and mental health services.

 - Our schools haven't recovered from the last recession. Our state constitution doesn't allow increases in taxes. This initiative affects only those who earn \$150K or more, and large corporations (who are currently experiencing a drop in taxes from 35% to 21%).
 - It freezes property tax rates so they don't go down as home values go up.

- This initiative would get us close to national average.
- We know another recession is around the corner.
- This initiative would mean \$23.8 million for LPS.
- This is a graduated tax. 3% of families would see a tax increase that affects the most affluent, but they've gotten big tax cuts recently from the government.

Looking ahead to the future

- Projected skills needed coming out of high school are changing quickly. Creativity and complex problem solving will be high on the list.
- LPS will build an Innovation Center on the property across the street from Littleton High School. We are purchasing the property now. There is a lease agreement for the property for two more years. We anticipate opening it in the Fall of 2021.
 Programs will include health sciences, robotics, STEM, tech, drafting, tiny home construction.

Facility renovations

- Another challenge we have is wheelchair access.
- Newton is not salvageable. Engineers say they can't salvage the slanting floors.
 Newton isn't unsafe, just unfixable.
- There are challenges with athletic fields and gyms. They were all built before Title 9. Fields are overused.
- Newton needs to be rebuilt. The old school will be kept going while the new one is being built. Then they will open at the new school while tearing down the old school.
- Schools are now being built with multiple levels (not single level like our elementary schools are now) that take up less space.
- o If the bond doesn't go through, they will continue to fund only maintenance of the facilities. Safety and security will be top priority.
- What would we do differently with all this money
 - Full day kindergarten
 - Tech and trade classes and resources offered in high school as an alternative to college. Trades will look different in the future, and will incorporate new technologies (e.g., drones, robotics, 3D printers, self-driving cars), better engineering opportunities
 - Lower class size
 - Adding mental health resources
 - Consider universal preschool

<u>Laura Mutton - Great Schools Thriving Communities</u>

- In addition to Initiative 92, a new bond is being proposed.
 - o \$300 million bond over 25 years
 - \$40 a year for every \$100K of home value
 - Capital needs could be addressed by a combination of bond, capital reserve, and/or grant funding.
 - o Laura passed out petition forms to those interested in collecting signatures.
