COMMUNITY

Littleton Public Schools serve the City of Littleton and adjacent unincorporated areas. Littleton is bordered by Denver on the north and is a suburban area with many business and professional residents. The student population is approximately 15,500. There are thirteen elementary schools, four middle schools, two charter schools, three alternative programs, and three high schools.

VARIABLE SCHEDULING

The variable schedule is an adaptation of college semester scheduling. Many classes meet fewer than five periods each week. The periods per week depend upon the demands of the course. Most class periods are at least 50 minutes. One semester hour of credit is granted for every period per week spent in class or lab. Variable scheduling enables students to have:

1. A more diversified educational experience through a broad range of course offerings
2. Opportunity for counselors and teachers to meet and plan with students on a one-to-one basis.
3. Opportunity for students to develop responsibility through the wise utilization of unscheduled time.
4. A variety of resource centers and open computer and science laboratories.

*In 2020-2021 students are attending a Block-Hybrid Schedule due to Covid-19 restrictions.

SPECIAL CLASSES

Needs and accommodations for students with Individualized Education Plans, Advanced Learning Plans, and Section 504 Plans are addressed in the regular classroom by regular and Special Education staff.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT

In 2020, students took examinations in AP Seminar, AP Research, Music Theory, English Language & Composition, English Literature & Composition, European History, Human Geography, Psychology, Macroeconomics, Microeconomics, US Government & Politics, US History, Calculus AB, Calculus BC, Statistics, Biology, Chemistry, Physics 1, Physics C-Electricity & Magnetism, Physics C-Mechanics, Computer Science, Computer Science A, French Language, German Language, and Spanish Language. Of the 957 exams taken by 483 students, 718 exams were graded three or higher. Heritage is one of the select few high schools in Colorado to offer the INCubator Entrepreneurship Program and the AP Capstone program and diploma in the 2019-2020 school year.

CARNEGIE UNITS—IN CONVERTING SEMESTER HOURS INTO CARNEGIE UNITS OF CREDIT, ALLOW ONE -HALF UNIT PER SEMESTER FOR 3, 4, AND 5 SEMESTER HOUR CLASSES AND ONE-FOURTH UNIT FOR 2 SEMESTER HOUR CLASSES. THESE RECOMMENDATIONS ARE BASED UPON STUDIES DONE AS PART OF OUR ACCREDITATION AND WITH THE SANCTION OF THE COLORADO DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND THE COLORADO HIGH SCHOOL ACTIVITIES ASSOCIATION.

GPA AND CLASS RANK – GPA and Class Rank are based on Grades 9-12. All courses for which students earn an A, B, C, D, or F grade are factored in the GPA. A course grade of a P (Pass) is not factored in the GPA. If a student repeats a course, both grades are factored in the GPA. All Students are included in class rank. Weighted grades are outlined below.
