LETTER FROM SUPERINTENDENT EWERT

Dear LPS Community Members:

You may have heard us say, All Means All in LPS. All students - regardless of race, ethnicity, religion, disability, twice exceptionality, students who are gifted, immigrants, English language learners, LGBTQ, homeless, poor, affluent, and those who may have social, emotional, behavioral or academic challenges - matter. All students deserve our very best. That means providing equity and opportunities so that all students receive the education they need in order to excel.

Thanks to your support, we have made improvements to our system that help us provide equity and more opportunities for our students. Weekly Professional Learning Commu-

nities (PLCs) have provided additional time for teachers to meet the needs of the students they serve, and we have already seen the benefits of this change. Shifting school start times to better align with what research tells us is best for adolescents will be impactful, as well. We look forward to the change to school start times this fall. The work of the Long Range Planning Committee continues as members focus on the current state of LPS facilities, program capacity, demographic changes and major capital equipment requirements in order to protect our community's investment in its schools and to best serve students in the future. In August, the LPS Board of Education will consider the findings of the Long Range Planning Committee within current budget constraints. The Board will also engage in thoughtful conversations about the possibility of asking local voters to support a bond election this fall to make this vision for our students' future a reality.

There also is a statewide effort, Initiative 93, to ask Colorado voters to pass a ballot initiative this fall to help pay back the \$5.8 billion of state school funding owed to Colorado's K-12 students for their education. Passage of Initiative 93 would mean an additional \$23.1 million annually in LPS, which would help us fund priorities related to early childhood education, adequate school staffing, Career and Technical Education programming, security and mental health supports, and additional academic supports for our most vulnerable students among other things. I encourage you to learn more about this statewide effort.

Our focus on providing our very best to our students will continue during the 2018-2019 school year. The LPS Board of Education has identified its priorities:

- Continue to build upon the important work happening in Professional Learning Communities, as this is the foundation through which all progress is made;
- Continue to plan for the effective use of resources into the future. The ongoing work of the Long Range Planning Committee will be critical to this process;
- Continue to refine, explore and expand academically rigorous pathways aligned to Colorado Academic Standards and community expectations. Innovative teaching and learning will be a focus as we find different ways to engage students in learning opportunities that prepare and empower students for the complex, rapidly-changing world of college and career;
- Continue to grow, refine and improve programs, processes and procedures as they relate to safety, security and mental health in our schools. This will include a conversation about homework and its impacts on mental health;
- Continue to lead advocacy efforts to expand funding for K-12 education.



LPS FUTURE VISION

IMAGINE THE POSSIBILITIES



More than 50 years ago, the Littleton Public Schools community built schools for its children and created a legacy that is still being realized today. This legacy has served us well and has made possible an outstanding education for generations of LPS students.

Aging schools also pose challenges. Because the average school building in LPS was built in the post WWII era, some schools are not compliant with ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) regulations. Aging schools are not as efficient and they require expensive renovation to meet today's safety and security expectations.

In addition, our aging schools were not built for the way today's students learn and live. They limit opportunities for students to work in small teams and experience complex hands-on learning. Some of our schools have been renovated to provide these opportunities, but renovations are not possible in all schools.

The needs and expectations for today's learning have changed. The rapidly changing job market demands more non-traditional skills of our graduates - like creativity, critical thinking

and entrepreneurship. Our graduates, whether continuing on to college or entering the workforce, need complex skills in science, technology, engineering and math - also called STEM.

In response, Littleton Public Schools is exploring ways to create a Career and Technical Education (CTE) Center in partnership with local community colleges. The CTE Center would expand upon the CTE programs already available in our schools and would better prepare all students regardless of the path they plan to take upon graduating from Littleton Public Schools.

This robust CTE programming would: offer valuable, hands-on learning experiences for students who plan to enter the workforce after graduation; enable more students to get on the path to earning an industry certification or two-year associate's degree; and better prepare students who plan to pursue undergraduate and advanced degrees in a CTE field. In many cases, this programming would facilitate pathways that could help to reduce the cost of a traditional 4-year college education for students and their families. A CTE Center would provide programming in fields including: auto-

motive, aviation, computer coding, construction, drones and robotics technology, electrical, healthcare, plumbing and welding and fabrication.

A recent community survey shows that these are priorities for the community we serve. In addition, the LPS Long Range Planning Committee, which represents a cross-section of the community including taxpayers with and without children currently in LPS, has spent the past 18 months reviewing the current state of LPS facilities, program capacity and major capital equipment requirements. The committee has considered what improvements to efficiency, sustainability and infrastructure may be required to best serve our students in the future. The committee shared its observations with the LPS Board of Education. Highlights included:

- LPS has a need for new and/or renovated school buildings that provide efficient and flexible spaces that allow for innovation, collaboration, and creativity. This space should also accommodate the growing number of students with special needs in their neighborhood schools;
- Districtwide full-day kindergarten and universal public preschool are desirable to give LPS students the best foundation for success;
- LPS has a need to make all of its facilities ADA compliant;
- LPS has a need to enhance and expand Career and Technical Education program offerings and provide innovative, creative learning spaces for students of all ages;
- LPS has a need to enhance and expand outdoor spaces to accommodate a wide variety of boys and girls activities and athletics; and
- LPS must continue to protect the community's investment in its schools and campuses including playgrounds and fields through appropriate upkeep in order to maintain a safe environment for students.

The goals of the LPS Board of Education and the findings of the Long Range Planning Committee align with our community's priorities. It is important to all of us that the quality of our schools helps maintain the Littleton area's reputation as a great place to live. We want to ensure

that we continue to have high-performing schools for our children that attract and keep the best teachers.

LPS is committed to providing the education that today's students will need for tomorrow's jobs and careers in an environment where our kids are engaged and passionate about what they are learning. We must continue to prepare our students for college while adding to

the menu of choices, which will provide more paths to college and career.

Next Steps

Over the next several months, the LPS Board of Education will consider the findings of the Long Range Planning Committee within current budget constraints. The committee will bring a detailed report to the LPS Board in August. The LPS Board of Education

will also engage in thoughtful conversations about the possibility of asking local voters to support a bond election in the near future.

CHANGING SCHOOL START TIMES

LPS students deserve the very best, and the Littleton Public Schools Board of Education is continuously striving to provide the education students need now in order to be prepared for life after high school. An impactful decision made last December for the 2018-2019 school year is the change of school start times to better align with what experts say about adolescent sleep patterns. The Board's unanimous decision to adopt the LPS Long Range Planning Committee's recommendation to change school start times followed months of research analysis, parent presentations and extensive opportunities for parent, student and staff input through public forums, open houses and surveys.

Research tells us that a later school start time positively impacts alertness, mental health, wellness and behavior in high school and middle school students, which means students are better prepared to learn. The new school start times better align with the latest research that shows teens' sleep patterns are different than those of younger children and adults.

According to National Jewish Health Adolescent Sleep Expert Dr. Lisa Meltzer, melatonin is a hormone released by the brain that controls the internal clock and prepares the body for sleeping. But during puberty, the timing of the melatonin release is delayed by up to 2 hours. This makes it nearly impossible for teens to fall asleep early. This shift is also seen in the morning hours, such that when we ask a teen to wake at 6 a.m., that is equivalent to asking an adult to wake at 4 a.m. An adolescent's brain is biologically asleep at the time we ask them to wake up - often to get behind the wheel of a car - to go to school and learn.

This change in school start times directly correlates to the Board's commitment to the academic and social/ emotional well being of all students. Changing school start times to better align with what sleep experts tell us about adolescent sleep patterns cannot be done in isolation; it is just the first of several issues that need to be studied. "Changing to later middle and high school start times isn't THE answer, but it's AN answer and part of a larger solution. We as a Board are committed to looking at the other factors that contribute to the mental health of our teens - things we can influence such as homework, screen time, social media and the tendency to

overschedule our kids," said Jack Reutzel, LPS Board of Education president. "We will need parents to partner with us and help us in these efforts."

In April, the LPS Board of Education received an update related to the implications of changing school start times. Fees for School Age Child Care (SACC) have been established. Most elementary enrichment activities will take place after school Monday through Thursday. Current athletic practices, club and activity meeting times at high schools and middle schools will be evaluated, and schools will make every effort to schedule as many after school as possible in order to accommodate our teenagers' need to sleep longer in the morning. Scheduling a compressed transportation schedule to accommodate the change in school start times will cost LPS about \$137,000. This is a manageable cost considering nearly 8,000 middle and high school students in LPS will benefit from a later school start time.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

How much sleep do adolescents need?

Adolescents have a biological need for 8 to 10 hours per night. We know this from a series of studies where adolescents went to "sleep camp" and spent 3 weeks in a lab. They were allowed to catch up on lost sleep, and then sleep as much as they wanted. In this setting, adolescents naturally slept an average of 9.3 hours per night.

How much sleep do most adolescents

In the U.S., 7 out of 10 adolescents get less than 8 hours of sleep. There is no reason to believe this is any different in the Littleton Public Schools district. Consider, if your child has to wake at 6 a.m., he/she would need to be asleep by at least 10 p.m. in order to obtain the *minimum* recommended 8 hours of sleep (which for most teens is not enough.)

What happens when teens don't get enough sleep?

Every aspect of functioning is negatively impacted by not getting enough sleep:

- Students who miss out on only 1 hour of sleep per night for 5 nights have been shown to have increases in ADHD like behaviors (inattention and impulsivity.)
- Similarly, students who go to bed 1 hour later for just 3 nights perform a full grade level below students who

are getting enough sleep on tasks of short term memory, fine motor skills, and problem solving.

- Teens who do not get enough sleep have increased risk-taking behaviors and accidents.
- Negative mood is associated with insufficient sleep, with one study of over 30,000 students showing that for each hour of lost sleep there was a 38% increase in feeling sad or hopeless, and a 58% increase in teen suicide attempts.
- Insufficient sleep is directly related to obesity, heart disease, and diabetes.
- Drowsy driving accidents increase. After 17 hours of wakefulness, reaction time, decision making, and concentration are impaired as if a person has a blood alcohol level of 0.05 (legal limit in Colorado.)

What about elementary school students? Won't starting school earlier negatively impact them?

As previously described, it is difficult for adolescents to go to bed earlier due

to pubertal changes in their internal clock. That is not the case for elementary school students, who are biologically predisposed to earlier bedtimes and wake times. One study found that pre-adolescent students have the same degree of focus at 7 a.m. that adolescent students have at 8 a.m. In addition, districts who have changed start times report elementary students to be more engaged and ready to learn when they haven't been in before school care or watching television for 1-2 hours before school starts (which often occurs for later starting elementary students).

What changes have other districts experienced after changing school start times?

Tremendous benefits for students have been shown following later school start times for middle and high school students, including students getting more sleep, increased attendance, and higher graduation rates. Further, increases in achievement scores are on par with reducing class sizes, which then reduces the achievement gap for many students. Students also report less depression and caffeine use, and there are fewer car crashes (a 70% reduction in one district!) It is important to note that districts have not found changes to the number of hours students spent on homework, jobs, or sports/activities.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS

SAFETY AND LEARNING



When Arapahoe County Sheriff Deputy Mark Edson walks into a class-room at any of the nine elementary Littleton Public Schools he serves, students swarm him for high-fives, hugs, fist bumps and sheriff stickers for their notebooks. As a School Resource Officer (SRO), Edson wouldn't have it any other way. "First and foremost, my job is to protect the kids and staff in the building, and it's also about breaking down barriers so the kids feel they can come to me if they need help," said Edson.

Since the early 1980s, School Resource Officers have been a part of the school community in Littleton Public Schools (LPS). SROs are sworn law enforcement officers who are responsible for providing a law enforcement presence in school buildings. During a typical school day, an SRO walks the halls for security, but also talks with students. Between classes, at lunch and on the playground, SROs offer students the opportunity to discuss whatever is on their mind with the intention of becoming part of the student's daily routine at school.

The SRO works closely with administrators to create a safer environment for both students and staff by assuming

three distinct roles in the school setting: that of educator, informal counselor and law enforcer. This triad allows SROs to inform students about law-related topics through classroom instruction, provide them with a trusted role model/counselor and produce a safe and secure building.

At the elementary level, the SRO provides a foundation of respect and builds

a relationship that students can trust during their school years, leading to a better understanding of what to do, and what not to do, when making decisions that affect others. Edson, who grew up in Littleton and attended Littleton Public Schools, loves working in the area and in the schools where he grew up.

"I'm a law enforcement officer inside a school building - but I'm also a friend and an authority figure, part of the safety team, part of the counseling team and part of the welfare team," said Edson. Edson hopes that if he can put in more work at the elementary level, it will alleviate the work that the SROs at the middle and high school level have to do when these kids move up.

The SRO is just one part of extensive security measures LPS has in place throughout the district, including: 24-hour centralized electronic security monitoring for all district facilities, a radio communication system that allows 24-hour direct contact with law enforcement agencies, ID badges for key card access controlled entry, improved sight lines and rapid 24/7 response protocol. But even with the latest security technology deployed, the SROs utilize smiles and face-to-face interactions to build strong relationships in their school communities.

"I try to say hi to every student I see, and I work at making connections with them so they see me as a person AND an officer," said Powell Middle School SRO Kristin Bunten. With five years



of SRO duty at Powell and more than 20 years of experience in law enforcement, including six years as a detective, Bunten knows what early intervention can do for a kid's future - and she takes that role personally. "It feels like family here at Powell. I cry for these kids, I love them and sometimes I have to discipline them. In some cases, and this is when it's tough, I'm the only person in their life that will do all three. I try to teach them that actions have consequences and I offer guidance that hopefully keeps them from making big mistakes. In the end, my job is to protect the community and the students."

Because the LPS district has schools in both Littleton and Centennial, the SROs are employed by the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office and the Littleton Police Department. The total SRO budget for the LPS program is more than \$1 million per year - thankfully the cities of Littleton and Centennial cover half of that cost, which makes the program possible. Every middle school has a full-time SRO and every high school has at least one full-time SRO. Additional SROs share coverage of the elementary schools in the district.

"The SRO program has become an invaluable partnership between Littleton Public Schools and the Cities of Littleton and Centennial," said Clay Abla, Director of LPS Secondary Education. "They provide safety and security for our students and staff and have



become an essential part of our school district family. They aren't just patrol officers - they come in and get to know the kids, the staff and the parents, so when issues arise, they have a foundational relationship to help them problem solve. They have become part of the staff and are crucial to the well-being of our LPS community."

Maintaining a safe and secure learning environment is at the core of the SRO's role in the LPS community, and our schools are safer because of their presence and dedication. The SROs

are in a unique position to effect real change at every level with their collaboration. "In my day-to-day SRO activities, I do my best to ensure that the school stays at a high level of awareness for the safety of the building. It's a team effort in our schools to educate and protect," said Deputy Edson. "My job is to connect with kids and train and teach staff to be aware and prepared. Our work is to prevent a problem before it happens, but when someone needs help, we are coming. And quickly. Nothing is more important that being sure our students are safe."

GRADUATION MOVING TO RITCHIE CENTER



Littleton Public Schools is pleased to announce that, beginning with the Class of 2019,

Arapahoe High School, Heritage High School and Littleton High School will hold their graduation ceremonies at the Ritchie Center on the University of Denver campus. Each LPS high school will participate in separate graduation ceremonies, held at different times, on Saturday, May 25, 2019.

The decision to move to a Saturday graduation indoors follows a year of conversation and inquiry. Many school districts choose to hold graduation ceremonies indoors on a Saturday because they share similar concerns. Concerns in LPS include annual worries that rain and lightning could force graduation to move inside a high school gym, severely limiting the number of family members who could attend; lack of adequate parking at the LPS Stadium; over-capacity crowds; and safety.

Moving graduation to a large, indoor venue on a Saturday offers many benefits to families:

- Alleviates concerns about heat, lightning, rain or snow;
- Will not have to limit the number of attendees due to limited seating;
- Ample parking available;
- Fewer athletic schedule conflicts and fewer national testing day conflicts for our graduates;
- More convenient for out-of-town family members to travel to attend a Saturday ceremony.

Each high school will provide additional details for the Class of 2019 as they become available.







EARLY HIGH SCHOOL AT LITTLETON HIGH SCHOOL

The Early High School program at Littleton High School allows 8th graders who are ready for high school-level instruction to get a jump-start on their high school experience. This program is designed for 8th grade students who excel in the arts, technical fields, math or sciences.

The program is open to 8th graders who are socially and academically ready to become full-time students at Littleton High School. They will take a combination of 8th grade and high school classes, completing academic prerequisites earlier and making room for more choices later in high school. These students will have more flexibility in whatever academic pathway they pursue – International Baccalaureate (IB), Advanced Placement (AP), concurrent enrollment courses, STEM or Career/Technical Education courses.

The Early High School program is a unique experience, as it lets 8th graders take classes alongside Littleton High School students but they will convene for a daily Humanities block consisting of the state-required language arts and social studies curricula. 8th graders will have a sequestered,





Child Find Team Offers Free Preschool Screenings

The Littleton Public Schools Child Find Team offers FREE developmental screenings for newborns and children up to five years of age who show delays in development that could interfere with their education and learning. The team consists of an occupational therapist, speech/language pathologist and a school psychologist. The screening provides general information about a child's current speech/language, motor, social and pre-academic skills. It takes approximately one hour.

Families must live within the District boundaries to access these services. Following the screening, parents will receive feedback from the Child Find Team. If screening results indicate possible delays in development, the Child Find Team will recommend further assessment. (Screenings are not an assessment for kindergarten readiness.)
